The number of people living as refugees in Europe is at its highest level since 1999, with 1.1 million Syrians entering the region since January 2012, according to the latest figures. UNHCR is working hard to address the situation. At the same time, with the end of the winter period of high summer temperatures, the conditions of displaced people are rapidly deteriorating. The Agency is responding to the humanitarian needs of refugees and internally displaced persons in Europe. Our top priorities in Central and Eastern Europe remain in the area of shelter and livelihood. We are planning for the winter and can support displaced people to stay warm and keep their families together. At the same time, we continue to provide food and other essentials to make sure people are fed and sheltered. Our response also involves helping refugees access work and higher education, and to stay safe and healthy. We are continuing our work with partner agencies to provide food, shelter and other necessities to refugees and internally displaced persons in Greece and Turkey, including in camp and transit centres. We work with partner agencies in Serbia and Montenegro to help refugees in their home countries and transit countries return home. UNHCR's response to the refugee situation in Serbia and Montenegro is concentrated in a number of specific areas: 1. Humanitarian Operations A rapid response team is on the ground to assist refugees arriving in Serbia and Montenegro from Kosovo and Albania. UNHCR is working with the Ministry of Refugees, Migration and Family Life and other humanitarian organizations to ensure the overall coordination of humanitarian and refugee-related aid. In addition, UNHCR is providing assistance at transit camps on the borders of Serbia and Montenegro. 2. Registration and data collection As of 24 January, we have registered more than 48,000 people in Serbia and Montenegro, with registrations continuing in areas of the country where winter conditions were not too bad. UNHCR is still working hard to increase the rate of registration. The Agency is coordinating the registration of refugees with the Government and other partners. We have started an information campaign to ensure people know what
